Ambitious projects such as this easily lend themselves to unfortunate factual errors and the exclusion of important works. Bellini has compiled a volume that is impressively accurate and complete. Its 1g chapters cover writing in all genres from the pre-Columbian period to the early 1980s, including such recent phenomena as the Colombian novel of the 1970s and early 1980s and Chilean poetry written in Chile and abroad after 1973. Seen in its totality, the study is a wellresearched and balanced presentation of Spanish American literature.

" for Bellini's basic approach is to discuss the writers by nation, region or literary example, he begins with a 30-page introduction and then describes the phenomenon nation by nation, focusing primarily on one or two writers and then discussing the other contemporary novelists briefly.
