The Iliad ends with the funeral of Hector. In itself, this ending is a striking conclusion to a poem whose chief hero is Achilles. Simultaneously, it is the completion of a theme which dominates the last third of the epic, the treatment and especially the maltreatment of the dead. This theme pertains most immediately to the major figures, Achilles, Hector, and Patroclus; but by the end of the poem it includes nearly all the main characters. To some degree, as we shall see, it also guides the rhythm of the narrative in the last eight books.


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
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
