I know that these standards will be welcomed throughout the world and certainly, as Editor of *Paraplegia*, I look forward to receiving articles for future publications in the journal when the authors may well wish to utilise the standards provided in the booklet which is now set out fully as a paper in this issue of *Paraplegia*.
