As Kurzweil explains, "The Singularity will represent the culmination of the merger of our biological thinking and existence with our technology, resulting in a world that is still human but that transcends our biological roots. There will be no distinction, post-Singularity, between human and machine nor between physical and virtual reality. If you wonder what will remain unequivocally human in such a world, it's simply this quality: ours is the species that inherently seeks to extend its physical and mental reach beyond current limitations."

What does this mean in practical terms? Human aging and illness will be reversed. World hunger and pollution will be solved. Our bodies will be transformed by nanotechnology, so that, for example, we will eventually be able to augment and replace our biological organs and vastly extend our intelligence. The book also considers the philosophical and social ramifications of these profound changes. What for instance becomes of human political, social, and religious institutions, of human consciousness, the question of identity, the meaning of death?

In **THE SINGULARITY IS NEAR**, Kurzweil expands on these concepts as well as addressing what critics ranging from government officials and organized religion to humanists and other scientists will likely have to say regarding The Singularity.
